Missionary of the Week:

TRENT AND LISA DAVIS Chaplain United States Air Force Chaplain Corps Bolling AFB, Washington, D.C. "On the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared.

They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body." — Luke 24:1–3

Throughout the Gospel of Luke, Jesus speaks with striking clarity about what awaited Him in Jerusalem. He foretold His betrayal, His death, and—on the third day—His rising. He said it not once, but many times. And yet, His disciples struggled to grasp the meaning of His words.

Perhaps it was more than they could bear: the thought that the One they called the Son of God could suffer and die. Perhaps they could not bring themselves to imagine life without Him, or to comprehend the mystery of what would follow. The idea that death might not be the end must have seemed—then as now—beyond belief.

On the first day of the week, three days after His arrest and crucifixion, Mary Magdalene and other women who had followed Jesus made their way to the tomb. Because His death had come just before the Sabbath, the rituals of burial had been left incomplete. Now, with spices and oils in hand, they came to anoint His body and honor Him in death.

But the tomb was empty.

Instead of a lifeless body, they found two figures clothed in dazzling garments. Overcome, the women bowed low—an instinctive gesture of awe and reverence, often seen in Scripture when mortals encounter the divine. And then came the question—gentle, piercing, unforgettable:

"Why do you seek the living among the dead?"

It is one of the most profound lines in all of Scripture. It does not chide; it invites. It reminds. It awakens memory and faith. The messengers urge the women to remember that Jesus had spoken the truth all along. He is not there. He is alive.

We, too, live in a world where death often seems to have the final word. It is easy, in moments of sorrow or despair, to lose sight of the promise. Despite hearing this story year after year, the hope of Easter can still feel elusive. We doubt. We wonder. We grieve.

And yet, the truth remains: Jesus is who He said He is. And by the grace and mercy of God, He brings life where we expected only death, and redemption where all seemed lost.

So the question still echoes through the centuries:

Why do you seek the living among the dead?

He is not here.

He lives.

And in Him, so do we.
